Why "Starfish"?

Once, as a man was walking along a beach, he noticed a boy off in the distance going back and forth between the surf's edge and the beach. As the man approached, he saw that hundreds of starfish had been stranded on the sand as the tide retreated.



The man was struck by the apparent futility of the task. With so many starfish, many were sure to perish. But the boy continued to pick up the starfish one by one and place them back in the surf.

As he came up to the boy the man said, "There are miles of beach covered with starfish. You can't possibly make a difference." The boy stooped down, picked up one more starfish, and carefully placed it back in the ocean. Then he turned to the man and said, "It sure made a difference to that one!"

Who We Are

The heart of our Starfish program is keeping students active and engaged in academic, cultural, and athletic activities. We believe that, in order to be successful, students need more than academic preparation. They also need exposure to enriching cultural experiences that more affluent Stamford students take for granted. These help to instill a growing sense of confidence that positively impacts a child's life.

What is unique about Starfish Connection? We select five or more promising 3rd-grade students each year from the Stamford Public Schools. Each of our students is matched with an individual mentor who is committed to guiding that student from 3rd grade through 12th grade and beyond. Most mentoring programs are short-term interventions. Our program is longitudinal, comprehensive, and individual – it's about transforming lives one at a time.

Enrichment Activities

Self-Selected and Summer Programs

Throughout the year our mentors work with their students to choose extracurricular programs tailored to the interests of each individual child. In many cases, these instructional programs would be out of reach financially. Starfish Connection pays the tuition and fees, often at a reduced rate through the generosity of our Community Partners, while mentors help the families with arrangements.

Our students have selected a wide variety of enrichment programs including individual drawing instruction, music lessons, ballet, and sports.

Students often lose much of their academic progress over the summer while school is closed. We see summer as a time to experience new adventures, as well as a time to stay connected socially and to grow intellectually. All of our students attend camp programs, many enjoying their first opportunity to spend two or more weeks away from home at sleepaway camps. This experience is exceptional in helping students maintain active, healthy lifestyles. The students develop self-confidence and independence, and they have an opportunity to learn important leadership skills.

Group Enrichment Program

In addition to individual activities, Starfish Connection engages students in group events designed to expose them to music, art, and theater, as well as science, athletic challenges, and recreational events.

Elementary School

Our elementary mentors and team leader Lisa Musilli selected six group enrichment programs for our youngest Starfish students this year. These included a community service project at Mill River Park, a music program with Connecticut State Troubadour Kristen Graves, and a trip to New York City for a performance of the production *Something* at the New Victory Theater.

Over the winter break, the students visited Stepping Stones Museum for Children to learn about energy. Rounding out the year, our youngest Starfish cruised on the SoundWaters Schooner and spent time on the popular and challenging ropes course at Scalzi Park.

Middle School

To help students as they meet new challenges socially and academically, facilitator Harriet Ketover and team mentors planned several "teen circles." These provide a supportive forum where students can

discuss issues they may be facing. Discussion topics include coping skills, developing a framework of



values, self-advocacy, peer pressure, resilience, and GRIT. As a special field trip this year, the students visited the Pray Achievement Center in Greenwich.

In June, those middle school students who will be moving up to high school attend a special celebration. Starfish Connection provides each of the students with a laptop computer and appropriate software to help them prepare for high school success.


This year we also increased the number of social activities for our oldest students to help them maintain strong connections with the Starfish program and to

When the first Starfish students entered high school, we began to develop a college selection and application process. This year, mentor and high school team leader Jami Lo took steps to strengthen and customize the process even further as our first three students reached their senior year.



Academic Results

In spring 2017, Starfish students in grades three through eight participated in the Connecticut Department of Education's Smarter Balanced Assessment in English Language Arts (ELA) and Math based on the Common Core standards. Students are considered Proficient if they achieve Level 3 or Level 4 on the SBA. A total of 31 of the 39 Starfish students (79%) scored at Proficient.

Starfish students significantly outperformed their peers on this demanding test. While the number of

Starfish students is small and differences between groups need to be regarded with caution, Starfish students surpassed not only the High Needs students in Stamford, but also Stamford students as a whole, and Connecticut students statewide.

Science Results!

In addition, Stamford students in grades 5, 8, and 10 are required to participate in the state assessment in science. In spring 2017, Starfish students outperformed SPS students in grade 5 (100% at goal in comparison to 50% districtwide), grade 8 (60% at goal in comparison to 55% districtwide), and grade 10 (60% in comparison to 25% districtwide).
