## Why “Starfish”?

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Once, as a man was walking along a beach, he noticed a boy off in the distance going back and forth between the surf’s edge and the beach. As the man approached, he saw that hundreds of starfish had been stranded on the sand as the tide retreated.



The man was struck by the apparent futility of the task. With so many starfish, many were sure to perish. But the boy continued to pick up the starfish one by one and place them back in the surf.

As he came up to the boy, the man said, “There are miles of beach covered with starfish. You can’t possibly make a difference.” The boy stooped down, picked up one more starfish, and carefully placed it back in the ocean. Then he turned to the man and said, “It sure made a difference to that one!”

## Who We Are

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The heart of our Starfish program is keeping students active and engaged in academic, cultural, and athletic activities. We believe that, in order to be successful, students need more than academic preparation. They also need exposure to enriching cultural experiences that more affluent Stamford students take for granted. These help to instill a growing sense of confidence that positively impacts a child’s life.

What is unique about Starfish Connection? We select five or more promising 3<sup>rd</sup>-grade students each year from the Stamford Public Schools. Each of our students is matched with an individual mentor who is committed to guiding that student from 3<sup>rd</sup> grade through 12<sup>th</sup> grade and beyond. Most mentoring programs are short-term interventions. Our program is longitudinal, comprehensive, and individual – it’s about transforming lives one at a time.



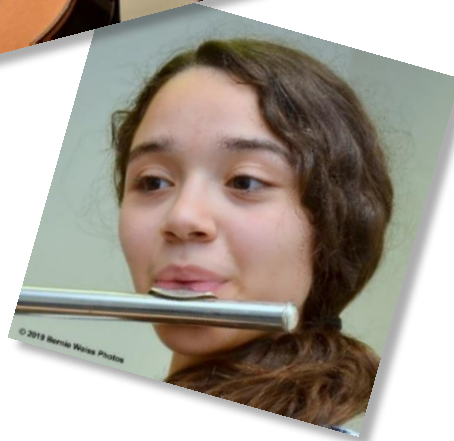


## Music

She spent a summer participating in the collegial atmosphere of Girls Who Code, which awakened an appreciation not only of coding but of the value of women working together on projects. She continued working after school with GWC. Her team built a website that provides vital information to children of immigrant parents about living safe, informed lives. Reina has volunteered at the Stamford Jewish Community Center's after-school program, and, for the past two years, she has worked in the Mayor's Youth Employment Program. Reina was accepted to UCONN Stamford with a Leadership Scholarship where she has selected a stimulating variety of classes. She is working this summer in the UCONN advisors office which will help pave her way to a fulfilling college career.

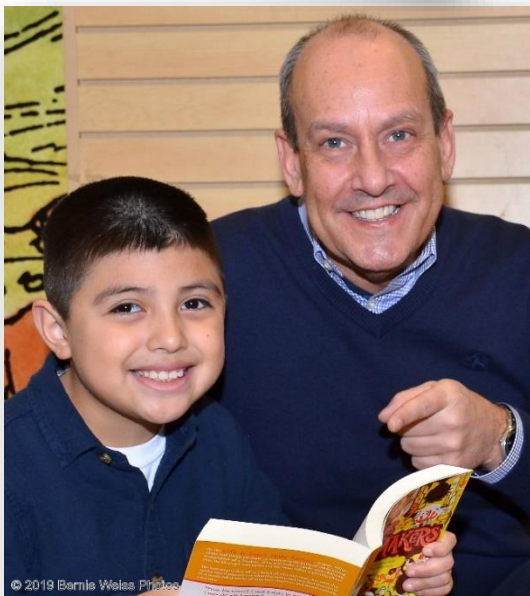

## Enrichment Activities

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Our mentors and students choose cultural and educational programs tailored to each child's individual interests. Starfish Connection pays the tuition and provides required materials, while mentors help with logistics. We are grateful to our Community Partners who offer us discounted rates for our students. Favorite programs include drawing instruction, music lessons, ballet, and sports.

In addition to individual instruction and coaching, Starfish Connection engages students in group events. These are designed to expose the children to music, art, and theater, as well as science and fun physical challenges. Highlights from our cultural program this year included painting at Weir Farm National Historic Site, visiting the Bartlett Arboretum, photography instruction with Bernie Weiss at Greenwich Point, and the perennially popular ropes course at Scalzi Park.





## Changing lives

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Each Starfish Connection mentor makes an amazing commitment, agreeing to guide his or her student from third grade through high school and beyond. This kind of long-term relationship is extremely rare among mentoring programs, but it is a hallmark of Starfish Connection.

Students and mentors affect each other's lives in unexpected and sometimes even extraordinary ways. Recently, Starfish mentor Sarah Arnold embarked on a journey inspired by her student. Here is her story:

Dear Starfish Friends,

This summer I spent two weeks in Antigua, Guatemala in a Spanish-language immersion program that included four hours a day of individual instruction as well as a homestay with a local family. The absolute highlight of the trip, however, was a visit with my student's grandparents and two aunts at their home in El Carrizal, about two hours away. This small *aldea* (village) is beautiful and quite remote. Running water is a luxury that not many residents enjoy. The family showed me around their village, helped me climb a huge mountain to view a gorgeous *mirador* (vista), and then made a delicious dinner. The farewell was a tear-filled one, because they very quickly made me feel like part of their family. As I hugged Emmi and Jairon's grandfather good-bye, he said, "*Estoy agradecido a Starfish por todo lo que están haciendo por mis nietos.*" (I am grateful to Starfish for everything they are doing for my grandchildren.) In that moment I realized how much Starfish means not only to our Stamford families, but to their extended families wherever they may live.

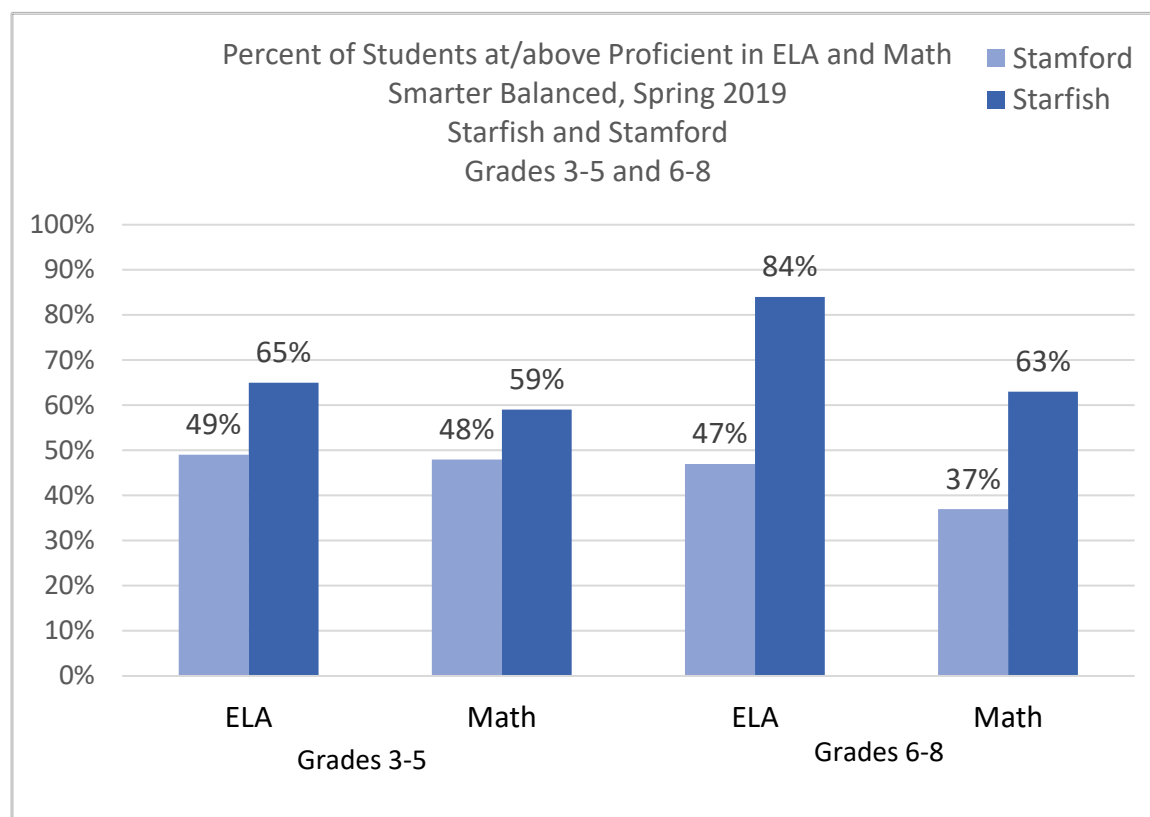


## Academic Results 2019

The Connecticut Department of Education uses the Smarter Balanced assessment to measure academic performance of students in grades three through eight. This annual test specifically measures student mastery of Common Core standards in English language arts and math.

In spring 2019, a total of 36 Starfish students participated in this assessment. The figure below shows a comparison of the performance of Starfish students with that of all students in Stamford Public Schools (SPS). Starfish students clearly outperformed their Stamford peers in general, and Starfish students in grades six through eight far exceeded the performance of their Stamford peers.

Statewide results for 2019 are not yet available, but traditionally Starfish students have compared very favorably to the cohort of Connecticut students as a whole. While the number of our students is small, and differences between student groups need to be regarded with caution, the performance of Starfish students on state assessments has consistently surpassed that of their peers both in Stamford and statewide over the years.

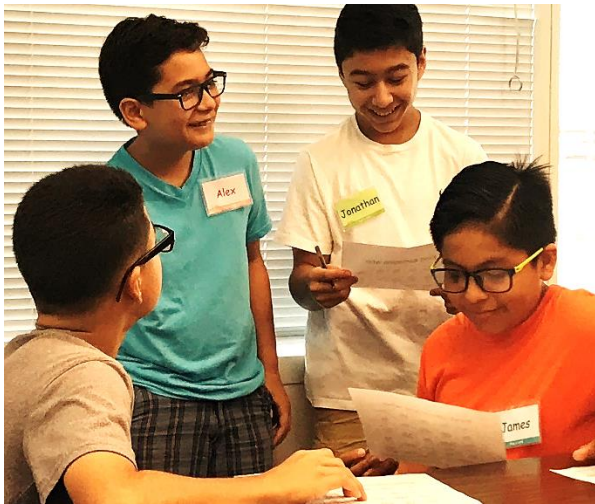

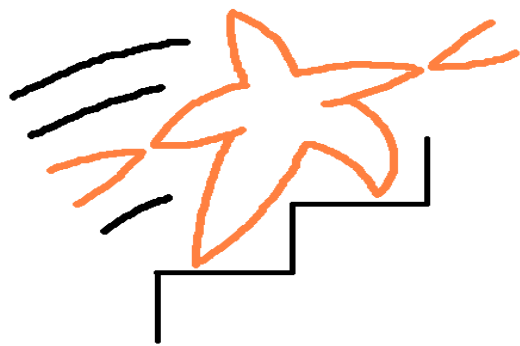
