

From the Executive Director

Dear Starfish Connection Friends and Supporters,

If I had to sum up this year, I would use the term, *resilience*. Our students, team leaders, mentors, and parents fought the virus and won, at least for now. Despite school closings, distance learning, isolation from peers, food and housing insecurity, and relatives who passed away due to Covid, we fought back together and made great strides.

Thanks to the generosity of our grantors, personal donors, and community partners, we were able to continue our mission. We provided needed computers and tech support to Starfish families. We adapted after-school and enrichment activities to the Zoom platform, including music lessons and tutoring. We also created fun activities and maintained SAT prep classes, book clubs with pizza delivery, and parent meetings.

Mentors stayed in touch with their mentees on Facetime and with walks in the park, museum trips, and other activities. By March, our community partners offered sports in small groups. This summer, our high school students are CITs and camp counselors, and our younger students are going back to day camps and sleep-away camp.

Our students continue to learn the value of giving back to our community. They performed in a music concert for the residents of a senior living facility, participated in an environmental, beach clean-up, volunteered at food banks, and one 11th-grader made a PSA video for Stamford Health to promote vaccinations for teens.

This year, four Starfish seniors graduated from high school with honors and are entering four-year colleges of their choice with scholarships. In addition, our very first cohort of three Starfish graduates, from 2017, has now graduated from college! One of the three former students is starting a graduate program in engineering while the other two are beginning their careers.

Thanks to their hard work and the dedication of their mentors, these students have bright futures and opportunities for themselves and their families for generations to come. This was Judith Martin's dream and her legacy.

Academics

This was a difficult school year, but our students were up for the challenge. Starfish mentors found many ways to keep our students engaged academically. They continued to organize book clubs moving adroitly from in-person get-togethers to Zoom meetings.

Many educators believe that studying music helps children develop discipline and good study habits. Every Starfish child chooses an instrument and begins lessons in elementary school. Despite Covid restrictions, our students continued music lessons with remote connections to their instructors. This provided a structure and sense of normalcy that helped students stay focused during school closures.

For our older students, PSAT and SAT prep classes continued virtually, and these sessions will resume in person this fall. Under the guidance of our Starfish high school co-team-leader Jami Lo, juniors and seniors attended virtual college tours and information sessions and even participated in one-on-one appointments with admissions counselors at various colleges. Jami also arranged individual parent meetings to discuss critical financial aid information and assist with application forms.

For our high school students, it was a year like no other, and all of our graduates distinguished themselves, enrolling in their colleges of choice with significant scholarships!

Last summer before the start of the school year, members of The Residence at Summer Street invited our high school students to an outdoor reception and generously provided a backpack filled with school supplies to each student. Over the winter, our music students wanted to express their appreciation for this kindness. They reached out to the residents and performed a delightful concert for them on Zoom.



Connecting with parents

Several years ago, former executive director and current board member Janet Schneider identified a critical need for Starfish to involve parents more closely in our Starfish program. Board member Maria Millan enthusiastically signed on, and she has developed a program of meetings for Starfish parents each year since.

This program provides parents with a forum to learn about the Stamford Public Schools and the path to higher education. It has three primary purposes: (1) to help parents understand and access the support offered by the school system; (2) to teach parents how to advocate for their children; and (3) to guide parents in implementing parenting strategies that ensure learning success in school.

Unexpectedly, the program also promoted more frequent communication among the parents and provided opportunities for them to share ideas with each other about cultural opportunities, homework, school programs, and college planning. It has been a resounding success!

Overall, 70% of Starfish parents attended at least one meeting this year, with several parents joining all three sessions!

In 2020-2021, Starfish presented three bilingual programs virtually for parents:

- *The Effects of the Pandemic on Your Child's Health* – An interactive program to help you identify anxiety, stress, and depression in your child, and what to do about it. Presenter: Dr. Paola Mallozzi, Marriage and Family Therapist LMFT and Starfish mentor.
- *College: It's Never Too Early to Start Planning* – A special presentation to help your child develop college readiness at every grade. Presenter: Jeanie-Melfi Smith, AVID teacher in the Stamford Public Schools and Starfish Connection board member.
- *Help, My Child Is Struggling In School!* – An opportunity to explore education strategies for supporting children with academic or behavioral difficulties. Presenter: Kiomary Sotillo, Connecticut Parent Advocacy Center (CPAC)

Parents have embraced these meetings and have reported that the presentations and discussions are very helpful. An astounding 70% of parents attended at least one meeting this year, and several parents joined all three sessions.


