It was 17 years ago when Starfish Connection was founded. Our longitudinal program of enrichment and mentoring for promising high-need students from elementary through high school continues to be a success.

This last year, like every year since our founding, Starfish students have exceeded the achievement of other high-need students in English/Language Arts and Math on state assessments. And since our first group of students graduated from high school and went on to college, every year we have graduated additional students and sent them to attend the colleges of their dreams. As a bonus, I can't count how many mentors have said to me that guiding these students has been one of the most rewarding experiences of their life!

Our mentors, community partners, team leaders, camp directors, music instructors, tutors, donors, Board members, and parents have all been critical to making this happen. Once again, we thank them for their hard work and dedication, making sure our students have bright futures for themselves and their families. We could never have achieved so much for these students without their help.

And to make all the parts work together, we have been very fortunate to have great leadership from our Executive Directors. My wife Judy Martin started Starfish Connection and grew it from scratch. She created a new model for mentoring, and with her love for the students and personal dedication she made it work. Unfortunately, Judy passed away just days before our first student received her acceptance letter from Tufts University.

But one of Judy's happiest moments was when Janet Schneider agreed to take Judy's place as Executive Director. Judy's trust and confidence in Janet was well founded. Janet not only ensured the continued growth and success of Starfish, but she made it better and it prospered under her care.

When Janet retired as Executive Director (she remains as an active Board member), Donna Wolff became our new leader. Donna faced a new challenge, the pandemic. In-person school classes were closed, student enrichment programs were cancelled, and mentors and students were often unable to meet together. But Donna persevered and managed us through these difficulties. I can't thank Janet and Donna enough for what they have done to serve our students and continue the Starfish legacy. Donna is staying on as a Starfish mentor, but she has decided to step down as Executive Director this last February.

It gives me great pleasure to announce that Regan Allan is our new Executive Director. In just a few short months her knowledge, experience, and consistent hard work have shown us all that Starfish is in great hands and is poised to grow and continue to improve in the future.

I am so proud of this organization, and proud of people like Regan and so many others, who contribute so much of themselves to make the world a better place for students on their journey through life. In the midst of so much turmoil in the world, the generosity of so many to help these promising students gives me renewed hope for the future. Thank you to all who have helped Starfish and in our journey.

Judy Martin was a hero of mine and when the Board asked me to follow in her footsteps, I was honored and excited to become part of a community of people who are passionate about the success of our Stamford Public Schools' students. I believe deeply in the Starfish mission and with my background in education, community experience in Stamford and just being a mother of four children, I know I can make a difference in the lives of Stamford's underserved students.

We had another successful year for our Starfish students, with enrichment trips, instrumental music back in school, camps, cultural events, tutoring and college preparation, parent meetings, and Teen Circles. You can read about our students who are excelling in various areas, students who have struggled during COVID, and of course our three Class of 2023 graduates who will be attending college. All about Jonathan Sanchez, written by his mentor Fran D'Agostino



2023 Starfish Mentor, Student and Parent Survey

Starfish is a humanistic program that prides itself on working one on one with students and mentors. At the same time, Starfish seeks continual growth and for that purpose group data are important. A survey, conducted in winter 2023 with students, parents and mentors, collected stakeholder requests for program growth.

It is gratifying to learn that "students love their mentors and want to spend more time with them." Mentors "love spending time with their students and feel guilty when they do not have as much time."



A common theme expressed by students, parents and mentors is a desire to explore and learn - students would love more field trips to historical and cultural sites; parents would like workshops "geared to specific ages" and are interested in their children learning to swim; mentors would like more training around topics like "social-emotional learning. cultural humility, racism and the curriculum of Stamford Public Schools."

With support from the Starfish Board and Program Leaders, the requests from the Starfish community will be on the agenda for the coming year.

Celebrating Our Starfish Milestones







At our high school graduation celebrations, graduating students and mentors share speeches about each other and receive gifts. Mentors receive a sweatshirt from the college where their student will attend and students receive a MacBook Air, \$1000 check for books and other college expenses, and \$500 dorm room shopping spree! We know college is expensive and we want our students to start off on an even playing field, so we equip them with some financial support so they can succeed.

Music Program 2023

Music continues to be an important component of a Starfish student's experience. Students are required to play an instrument from Grades 4-8. Many of our students choose to continue playing in high school and if there is interest, Starfish will pay for private lessons. The Stamford Public Schools music program is slowly growing back since COVID and we are proud of our partnership with the school system, as well as Intempo and Stamford Music and Arts Academy, so we can challenge, prepare and inspire our students to be the musicians of the next generation.




Enrichment Activities 2023

Starfish exposes students to events and experiences that they might not have otherwise, because we know the power of seeing the world outside your door. The 8th grade cohort started a book club, middle schoolers went Ziplining and the elementary school students visited Eden Farms. We also had some students attend shows such as the Nutcracker, the Stamford All School Musical and Stamford High's annual musical, Prom.

Again this year, The Residence at Summer Street community and staff accessed new school supplies from donors and filled and distributed fifteen new backpacks to our high school students in time for school.




College Prep

Navigating the college application process is daunting. We hire tutors and have retired Stamford Public Schools staff volunteer to assist students with finding the right college, practicing for SATs/ACTs, completing the college application and writing the dreaded essay. We also encourage mentors to visit colleges with their students and we charter a bus to take the entire high school group, including mentors, students and parents to visit a college.









Unexpected challenges have been thrown in Sury's path over the past 6 years. Most notably, the mold at Westover which forced her to adapt to a new elementary school and the hurdles COVID put in her way while transitioning to and graduating from Middle School at Scofield. Throughout it all she has been changing, adapting and moving forward. Each one of our Starfish have learned very early how to adapt and have done it beautifully.

Starfish has provided Sury with some wonderful summer adventures. She attended the Sacred Heart Outreach program through elementary school and for the past two summers she attended the Live Girl program held at St Luke's in New Canaan. She told me that her time at Live Girl "enabled me to get to know so many new people from different backgrounds while having fun learning new things". I have seen that participating in these programs has given her confidence and self-awareness that she will use to continue to grow and move forward.

Sury will be embarking on her high school journey at Westhill this fall. We are both excited for this next transition filled with ways to expand her already inquisitive mind, to make new friends, and to explore new opportunities. I feel so lucky to be a part of the team of family and friends looking out for her and guiding her on her way. I am looking forward to working with Sury and her entire cohort to be sure they have a smooth and successful start to their high school experience.








There are many challenges facing high school students as they begin embarking on the college process. Choosing challenging classes, but not impossible, managing homework, community service, jobs, extracurriculars, and family life to name a few. At the end of Sophomore year we begin to discuss colleges and the steps needed to move forward. They include staying on top of grades, deciding on which colleges to explore, visiting colleges, deciding whether to live at home or live on campus, preparing for the PSATs, possibly SATs, considering areas of study and finances. The list goes on and on! This is an exhausting and stressful process for the best and most supported students.

Our Starfish students are supported and guided through this process by their mentors, High School Team Leaders and parents when possible. During this process we occasionally find students who are emotionally struggling. We can sometimes identify difficulties when a student who had As begins to drop to Ds and Fs for no apparent reason. This is exactly what happened to several of our students last year and this year. Mentors recognized the problem and sought help from parents and guidance counselors. Here are their stories:



We expect a lot from our Starfish students and we have to evaluate students as whole persons- the mind, body and heart. When they demonstrate harmful negative behavioral changes, academic or personal, we need to consult their parents and their school counselor in an attempt to attain the resources to support them. If after taking these first steps our students continue to struggle and if they are receptive to professional counseling, we must have the resources to provide it. It is essential to have mental health practitioners available to meet our students' emotional needs. It can mean the difference between success and failure in the Starfish Program and more importantly, in each of their lives.
